## Budget Committee Approves General Fund Transfer of \$50,000 to Support Water System

The budget committee met on May 5th to discuss the proposed fiscal year 2008-09 budget, ultimately approving a \$3.7 million amended budget, peppered with over \$600,000 in expected grants for a variety of capital outlay projects. The budget officer also presented a dire outlook for the water fund citing an 80% decrease in the overage water amounts sold over the last three years and increasing personnel costs. The committee approved a \$50,000 transfer from the General Fund to the Water Fund to keep the system

solvent as officials review ways to reallocate personal services costs among the city's various fund. However, even with the transfer, the budget committee approved expenditures reliant upon an 8.7% increase in water rates to recover increases in operations and maintenance.

Almost \$1 million worth of capital outlay projects are identified in next year's budget with \$600,000 in grants offsetting the city's portion of those projects. Most of the grants center

around the fire department. The city is planning the purchase of a \$309,000 pumper truck replacing the 1988 GMC pumper. A combination grant and rural fire district contribution will replace the 1991 Chevy brush rig. In addition, the department is awaiting word on a \$132,000 grant that will replace older self-contained breathing apparatus.

Other capital outlay projects include the remodel of the community hall kitchen and bathrooms, repaving of Seventh St. from

Form LB-3 summarizes the budget detail sheets of funds that are levying a property tax. (General and Wastewater Debt Funds.)

The financial summary portion of the LB-1 totals the amounts from the funds presented on the LB-2 and LB-3 forms. Figures from each line of the LB-2s and LB-3s must add up to the total figure shown on the same line of the LB-1.

Form LB-4 summarizes the budget detail sheets of funds that have departments. (General, Wastewater and System Development Funds.)

sion line along the Miami River, replacement of a work truck and construction of a concrete stairwell to the clam beds at the end of Bay Lane.

In spite of salaries increasing at less than 5%, the administrative fees associated with retirement accounts, workers compensation and health benefits increased over 14%. In the following year, the city will be discussing options related to reappropriating personal services among the general, street, water and sewer funds. With water consumption at port-based businesses plummeting and a wetter-than-normal summer last year, the city will be analyzing ways to limit O&M costs in the water and sewer funds. **G**

In lieu of the publication requirements contained in ORS 294.416, the Garibaldi Urban Renewal Agency elects to publish its budget as provided by ORS 294.418. A GURA meeting will be held on Monday, June 9th at 6:30 p.m. at the Garibaldi Council Chambers, 107 Sixth St., Garibaldi, OR 97118. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008 as approved by the GURA Budget Committee. A summary of the budget is below. A copy of the budget may be inspected or obtained at Garibaldi City Hall, 107 Sixth St. between the hours of Noon and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The budget is also available free of charge at [www.ci.garibaldi.or.us](http://www.ci.garibaldi.or.us). This budget was prepared on a modified cash basis of accounting. GURA created a debt service fund on Feb. 19th to separate that activity from general fund operations. Major activities planned for FY0809 include construction of gateway signs, planning for a Garibaldi Plaza and public infrastructure projects as outlined in the Garibaldi Urban Renewal Plan. There are no personnel requirements this year. The signs will be expended from the beginning fund balance (\$6,600) and a grant (\$18,000) from the City of Garibaldi. The Plaza planning and public infrastructure projects would be expended from loans (\$83,000). **G**

# Effort Being Made to Establish Neighborhood Watch

■ Nation-wide program meant to make neighbors more aware of their surroundings

A neighborhood watch is neighbors helping neighbors. That's it. They are extra eyes and ears for reporting crime and helping neighbors. Members meet their neighbors, learn how to make their homes more secure, are alert to the potential for crime and watch out for each other. Neighborhood watch works with and is endorsed by the sheriff's office. It does not mean nosy neighbors. It does not mean trying to stop crime without the police. Your main responsibility is to call the police and report what you've seen.

It's been proven that neighborhood watch programs deter crime, keep drugs out of the neighborhood, make citizens aware and watchful of sexual offenders in their community and even help strengthen hometown security. Neighborhood watch is a very important part of emergency preparedness too. In case of emergencies such as tsunami or terrorist attack, it is easier to alert the community if neighborhood watch is in effect.

Neighborhood watch is set up with block captains. The block captain is responsible for knowing who belongs on their block and keeps up to date contact information in case of emergency. They communicate info about meetings and crime incidents. They serve as liaisons between block and police, relaying info and squashing rumors. Ideally there would be a phone tree involving the whole city.

There have been the usual concerned citizens coming forward and volunteering but we are still in need of block captains for many areas of town. There will be a block captain meeting on June 2nd at 10 a.m., all are welcome to attend.

After 70% of the city is involved we will be able to put up neighborhood watch signs. These are one of the biggest deterrents of crime. We have had generous donations by the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office and the Garibaldi Beau-

tification Committee to help pay for these signs. Godfrey's Pharmacy has also donated their support by making many copies of flyers and other literature.

Neighborhood watch meetings are a very important part of the program. Meetings are a place to voice your concerns about the neighborhood and to learn how to address those issues. There are plans for upcoming meetings to talk about home security, crime reporting and other neighborhood watch basics. As well as a neighborhood watch barbeque set for this summer. Get out and have some fun with your neighbors. Watch for flyers at the post office, library and city hall with dates and times.

Neighborhood watch started because of a need seen by some local residents. As a city of many transients and vacation houses, it is important that we watch out for each other.

It is disturbing to hear that your neighbor has passed away weeks earlier because no one thought to check in on her or that an elderly neighbor is afraid to leave her house for a walk because of the meth house down the street.

These things happened in Garibaldi. After being a victim of theft it was amazing to me that everyone I talked had been or knew someone who had been a victim of crime. It doesn't need to be this way. Neighborhood watch is a benefit to you, your neighbors and our great city of Garibaldi. But only together, can we make it a better, safer place to live.

# TEP Gears up for Tillamook Bay Guidebook

■ Volunteer opportunities await kayakers interested in developing water trails

For those who like to paddle in warmer climes, a day in the sun is coming after a cool start to the kayaking season. The Tillamook County Water Trail is in full swing with efforts now focused on the Tillamook Bay watershed.

If you have never considered this watershed as viable paddling terrain, think again. There are numerous sloughs and inlets around Tillamook Bay that may qualify as a kayaker's paradise, and now Spring's flora is in full bloom, offering spectacular scenery.

Always be careful when kayaking the Tillamook estuary. The onshore winds can blow strong, check local marine forecasts at: <http://seaboard.ndbc.noaa.gov/data/Forecasts/FZUS56.KPQR.html>

Try to paddle when the winds are blowing less than 10kt -15kt as the force against the tide can create large wind swells even in places you may not expect, so early morning is generally a good time. High tide offers more areas to paddle and less opportunity to get stuck in mud, and remember to always dress for cold water conditions in Tillamook.

## Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad back for Sixth Year

There are a few new things for 2008 for OCSR. The excursion schedule has been expanded again. The steam train will now run through the end of September. Also, Mondays will be added to the operation in July and August. This addition has been requested by OCSR passengers for some time now, and the OCSR crew is gearing for the addition. The final addition to the schedule will be two day long charter trips operating in conjuncture with RailsNW. Passengers will travel up the Salmonberry with opportunities to disembark and take part in the photo sessions, complete with locomotive runbys. Reservations can be made by calling (800) 717-0108.

There will also be a new passenger car on the train this summer. This old fashioned car will seat 96 people and be the first indoor car on the train during regular excursions. Crews are hard at work hoping to complete most renovations by early July.

OCSR has a very large project on the horizon. It is the most anticipated project to date and desperately needed. OCSR plans to build a Collection Restoration Facility in the Port of Tillamook Bay's Industrial Park, just north of the Tillamook Air Museum. The facility will be 17,500 sq. ft., enabling OCSR to preserve and restore its collection of which most is not currently accessible to the public. These pieces are stored outdoors and are deteriorating in the coastal climate. Some of the collection will be available for public viewing during a facility tour. Visitors will view static displays and have an opportunity to see a restoration in progress. OCSR is looking forward to what the future has in store.

# Dept. of Public Works 2007 Drinking Water Quality Report

The City of Garibaldi is pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. *Este informe contiene información muy importante. Tradúscalo o hable con un amigo quien lo entienda bien.*

## THIS REPORT SHOWS OUR WATER QUALITY AND WHAT IT MEANS.

Our water source is drawn from two wells located in the Miami Valley Aquifer. The City of Garibaldi has completed a delineation of our well field (the area from which the water supply is derived). The State of Oregon Health Division granted the well field delineation certifi-

cation on February 13, 1998. We have a Source Water Assessment Report (2004) available at our office that provides more information, such as potential sources of contamination of our Drinking Water Protection Area (DWPP).

A Water Master Plan has been updated and adopted in 2004.

The following tables show the results from sample tests taken out at the wells. This identifies that our main water supply is clean and healthy.

In this table and throughout this document you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided definitions within this document.

### TEST RESULTS FROM WELL FIELD

Tables I and II list results of contami-

nats, compounds and chemicals found in our well field. We also routinely test for a wide and broad spectrum of SOCs (Synthetic Organic Compounds) and VOCs (Volatile Organic Compounds). Which were tested for in March Of 2007, all came back as ND (Not Detected).

### TEST RESULTS FROM THE DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

The City of Garibaldi Water Department also routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. Table III shows the results of our monitoring for the period Of January 1 to December 31, 2007.

These are new tests we are required to sample for now that we are required to disinfect our water system. These tests check for hazardous by-products of the disinfection process.

### MICROBIOLOGICAL CONTAMINANTS

(1) Total Coliform. Coliform are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria may be present.

(2) Fecal coliform/E-coli. Fecal coliforms and E-coli are bacteria whose presence indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. Microbes in these wastes can cause short-term effects, such as diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms. They may pose a special health risk for infants, young children, and people with severely compromised immune systems.

### TEST RESULTS FROM RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL SITES

The 90th Percentile is the highest result found in 90% of the samples when they are listed in order from the lowest to the highest results. EPA requires testing for lead and copper at customers' taps most likely to contain these substances based on when the house was built. The EPA determined that if the sample results exceeded the Action Level (AL), the

City must take action in reducing the risk of leaching of lead and or copper. As you can see in Table V., your water was well below the action level on our last round of testing for the year 2005. Our

## DRINKING QUALITY REPORT DEFINITIONS

**PARTS PER MILLION (ppm) or MILLIGRAMS PER LITER (mg/l)** - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

**PARTS PER BILLION (ppb) or MICROGRAMS PER LITER** - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

**PARTS PER TRILLION (ppt) or NANOGRAMS PER LITER** - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

**ACTION LEVEL** - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**TREATMENT TECHNIQUE (TT)** - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

**MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL** - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water.

MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL GOAL** - The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

ND - Not detected. \* - analysis performed by Severn Trent Laboratories, Richland, WA. \*\* - analysis performed by Energy Laboratories, Casper, WY.

next testing cycle will be in 2008.

**IMPORTANT INFORMATION**

We have detected traces of copper and nitrates that were below the maximum contaminant level (MCL). MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink two liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

**NITRATES:** As a precaution we always notify physicians and health care providers in this area if there is ever a higher than normal level of nitrates in the water supply.

**COPPER:** Copper is an essential nutrient but some people who drink water-containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of Time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water-containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's disease should consult their personal doctor.

Some people may be more vulnerable to the contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immune compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections.

These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by crypto sporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or man made. These substances can be microbes, inorganic or organic chemicals and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants.

The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

If you're interested in receiving minutes, notices and other information from City Hall via the internet, send an email to kevin@ci.garibaldi.or.us requesting to be included on the **CITY'S E-MAIL LIST**. As the city's website is updated with new information, a quick email will link you to all new information. The city's website, since being online in June 2007, has averaged over 600 different visitors a month. Top page views include the city's municipal code, land use ordinances and downloadable forms. Staff is hoping to upload a Garibaldi Yellow Pages in July based upon business license renewals adding to the services available online.

Suzanne McCarthy's two-year mayoral position and Terry Kandle and Marv Evans' four-year City Council positions are all up for **ELECTION THIS FALL**. Incumbents and interested candidates must file a completed "Candidacy for Nonpartisan



Nomination" with City Hall by 5:00 p.m. on Aug. 26th. A certified petition containing no less than five signatures

of Garibaldi residents must accompany this filing. Petition forms can be obtained from the City Administrator starting June 4th and must be certified prior to being circulated for signatures. Information about filing for candidacy can be obtained from City Hall or on the City's website at [www.ci.garibaldi.or.us](http://www.ci.garibaldi.or.us). (Look under "City Government".) It is recom-

mended that petition forms be picked up no later than August 15th, to allow time for completion and return. To be eligible, candidates must have lived in Garibaldi for at least one year. Council seats are open positions, meaning that candidates will not be running for specific positions and that the top two vote getters will fill the two seats regardless of who they would be replacing.

Starting with the July bill (received in your P.O. Box around the end of July), utility users should be made aware of **WATER AND SEWER RATE INCREASES**. The City Council at their May 19th Regular City Council meeting adopted Resolutions 2008-10 and 2008-11. Resolution 2008-10 adjusted water rates (8.7%) to recover increases in operations and maintenance and the system improvement fee (2.3%) to account for construction cost increases. Water rates were last set by Res. No. 2007-06 on May 21, 2007. The system improvement fee may only be used for the replacement of the water system infrastructure and not toward operations and maintenance expenses. The recent transmission line project at Driftwood and Garibaldi Ave. was funded entirely with the source. Res. No. 2008-11 adjusted sewer rates for the second time during a five-year process of making up the \$77,000 annual debt service payment on the sewer plant. Below is what the typical base residential city utility bill should look like starting with the July billing:

#### MAY 19 GURA/CITY COUNCIL MEETING...

... scheduled a workshop for Monday, June 9th at 6:30 p.m. to further review Gateway Sign proposals from Susan Walsh and Lonnie Ortiz. GURA instructed staff to negotiate an agreement for the placement of the sign at the old Merritt property.

... will hold a public hearing regarding their fiscal year 2008-09 budget as well on the 9th.

... approved staff's request to close City Hall on Friday, June 27th and again on Monday, June 30th to reconcile the city's

books and transition to the new fiscal year. City Hall will re-open on Tuesday, July 1st. City Hall will be closed on Friday, July 4th as well for the Independence Day holiday.

... declined a request from Toby and Teresa Taylor to enter into a Development Agreement to extend the date for their conditional use that had expired to re-develop the "Upper Biak." Staff will assist the Taylors with a new Planned Unit Development (PUD) application if they are still interested in pursuing a development on the site. Council also instructed the planning commission to review the city's PUD, Subdivision and Conditional Use ordinances to make recommendations to the code that may provide for a more efficient process.

... approved a 6.2% increase in utility rates starting July 1st. Roberta Bettis voted against the 8.7% increase in water rates due to concerns she had received from senior citizens and low-income residents. The typical utility bill for a Garibaldi residence will go up \$4.23 from \$68.20 to \$72.43 starting in July. The rate increases are due to a significant increase in operations and maintenance specifically increases in personnel-related expenses and gasoline; and an 80% decrease in water overage consumption over the last three years.

... appointed ex-Mayor Everett Brown and Emmy Lou Orahood to the Planning Commission filling the positions vacated by Paul Schachner and Carolee North due to new ethics reporting requirements. The Monday, May 26th PC meeting will be rescheduled for Monday, June 2nd to accommodate the Memorial Day holiday.

... scheduled a hearing for July 21st to allow the public to comment on a request by John Forrstrom, 402 Garibaldi Ave., to convert Fourth St. to one-way southbound between Acacia and Garibaldi Aves.

**NEW SIGNS LIGHT UP MUSEUM.** The Garibaldi Museum took its share of damage from the coastal storm of December 2007. The siding was torn off the front

of the museum, shingles were blown off the roof and the road sign was snapped of its footing. Just a reminder that property owners, pursuant to Garibaldi Municipal Code 12.10.010, must **INSTALL HOUSE NUMBERS** on their buildings or homes. If the house or building cannot be seen from the street, the property owner should place an identification post with a house number sign at the entrance of the driveway. Without the house number emergency services will be hard-pressed to find you. Reflective house address signs are available for purchase from the Tillamook Volunteer Firefighter's Association for \$20. Their number is (503) 842-7587 Ext. 225.

Property owners who live within the

**SENSITIVE BIRD HABITAT OVERLAY ZONE (SBHOZ)** need to contact City Hall before building, cutting or otherwise disturbing the environment within the SBHOZ. The purpose of the zone (created in 1990) is to ensure that the heron rookery is protected from any conflicting activities. The city will contact an Oregon Dept. of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) representative to visit the site and determine whether the proposed activity is conducive with the state's management plan for the rookery. If the activity does not conflict, then the City will write a letter allow the use. This letter serves as the permit. Keep in mind that even though a tree may not have a nest in it, the tree may be a staging area that buffers the nesting grove. If any activity occurs without first checking in with the City or ODFW, a fine not to exceed \$500 may be issued.

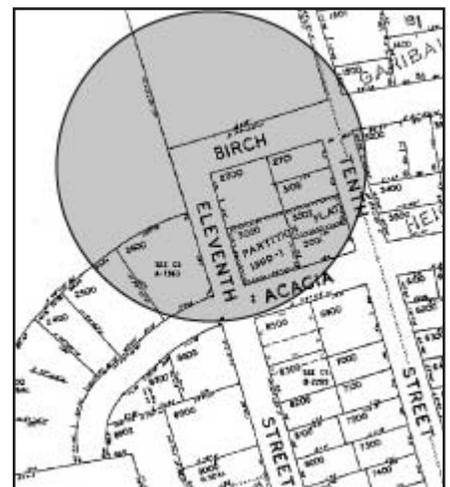
The slide has been replaced at the Lumberman's Park in May, with Christy Zerfing making the first slide down to test it for us. The Lions stay busy keeping up the city park.

... heard a report from staff regarding the installation of fire hydrants on the Miami-Foley Rd. transmission line funded by benefiting residents.

## MARCH 17 CITY COUNCIL MEETING UPDATE, COUNCIL...

... passed Ord. No. 305 adopting open burning policies. Councilor Kandle voted against the measure, feeling that enforcement of the ordinance will be difficult, if not impossible, for the fire department to enforce.

... approved a personal services contract with Joan Kelsey of Tillamook to serve as city attorney. Kelsey replaces Bill Canessa, who retired this winter after serving the city for 19 years.

... discussed city's \$123,000 FEMA pre-hazard mitigation grant application for the relocation of the city's water transmission line along the Miami River into the County right-of-way. **G**
